Office of the President (pass by driving)

The Presidential Office Building originally served as the seat of the colonial government during the Japanese occupation period. At the time of its completion in 1919, it was the tallest building in Taiwan. After Taiwan's retrocession, The building later served as the joint location of the Executive Yuan and Presidential Office before becoming the Presidential Office Building.



Chiang Kai-Shek Memorial Hall

This monument was built in memory of Chiang Kai-Shek, former President of the Republic of China. The Hall itself is located on the East end of Liberty Square and is flanked by the National Theatre and the National Concert Hall. The grounds themselves are beautifully landscaped gardens. The architecture of the hall is unique and its simple coloring of royal blue and white is very striking.



Taipei 101

The Taipei 101 building was the tallest building in the world when it was constructed in 2004. It stands at an impressive 508m, 101 floors, and its design is meant to mimic the shape and lines of the bamboo plant. Furthermore Taipei 101 has an incredible fast elevator, which takes passengers from the fifth floor to the observation platform within 37 seconds.

Longshan Temple

During the 18th century, the immigrants who settled in Taiwan faced many difficulties and environmental hardships. These hardships led the people to turn to the gods to ask for protection, these prayers and the ceremonies associated with them became the foundation for Taiwanese religious practices. Since its construction, Lungshan Temple has been a major religious center. Citizens gather there to resolve problems, find guidance and pray for the wisdom to make the right decisions.



Dihua Street and Dadaocheng

Dihua Street is Taipei City's biggest and oldest Old Street. Here you can find a large area with historical buildings and unique old style shops. Also there are many art spaces, museums, and restaurants to explore in the area. You should definitely make a stop to this historically rich area on your trip to Taipei.
